THE MARRIAGE VOWS

(Ruth 1:16-18)

INTRODUCTION

Ruth's expression of devotion to Naomi, her mother-in-law, is often used in marriage ceremonies to express the devotion desired between a husband and wife.

1. "I, _____, TAKE YOU, ____, "

It is a voluntary action - not a forced decision; selection; preference. When "taking" a mate, choose a Christian: (Deut. 7:3-4; 1 Cor. 9:5) "Reasons Why I Married A Christian" William Keele's article:

2. "TO BE MY LAWFUL WEDDED _____

"Lawful" - be sure you have a right to be married by law of land and by God. "Wedded" - (Matthew 19:5-6) "and the two shall become one flesh"

3. "I PROMISE TO ABIDE BY GOD'S HOLY ORDINANCE"

You are vowing to allow God's Word to govern attitudes and actions in the relationship.

4. "AND I PROMISE TO LOVE, HONOR, AND CHERISH YOU"

"Love" - it's show 'n tell; seeking what is best for the other.

"Honor" - respect or esteem shown as one is due; adoration; admiration; treat rightly.

"Cherish" - nourish; pamper; shelter; guard; treat with care.

5. "SICKNESS/HEALTH; RICHER/POORER; FOR BETTER/WORSE"

One person said, "I'd just like to take her for healthy, richer, and better." Remember, the promise is not "so long as everything goes well."

"Sickness" - what if a disabling accident happened on the honeymoon?
"Poorer" - what if one or both of you lost your jobs?

Can't say, "Been nice knowing you. Had fun while it lasted. Bye."

"Worse" - is there something worse than sickness and being poor? Get ready!

6. "AND I PROMISE TO KEEP MYSELF TO YOU ONLY"

Your vows contain two basic promises: one of love, the other of fidelity.

7. "SO LONG AS WE BOTH SHALL LIVE"

CLOSE - Just as there is preparation and commitment for marriage, there is the same when one becomes a Christian, the bride of Christ: (Acts 2:38; Rev. 2:10)
